WHO IS MIL-TREE?

Mil-Tree is a Southern California-based 501(c)3 charity, whose mission is dedicated to connecting the veteran, active military, and civilian communities through arts and dialogue. The organization aims to bridge the gap, open communication, and heal wounds of the soul by providing the greater community a way to create, converse, and understand each other better.

WHAT IS SANCTUARY?

The Sanctuary Project consists of a number of art workshops open to veterans, active military and civilians to create a structure at the Joshua Tree Lake RV and Campground. It will be built using the tools of war-- barbed wire and sandbags, in a process referred to as earthbag or super-adobe construction. The project will also include opportunities to participate in ceramics and metalworking that will be incorporated into the structure. This collaborative public art project is a gift to the community, and is intended to be used as a public gathering space for veterans, active duty and civilians.

HOW CAN WE PARTICIPATE?

The Sanctuary Project has three major components: ceramic workshops with Brian Bosworth at Copper Mountain College, mixed-media metal workshops with artist Bobby Furst at his Joshua Tree studio, and earthbag construction workshops with James Golub and Fox McBride on-site at the Joshua Tree RV and Campground, home of the Joshua Tree Music Festival. All of these workshops are **FREE**

Sanctuary is a collaborative public art project funded in part by the **California Arts Council's Veterans Initiative in the Arts**. Mil-Tree's Sanctuary partners include **San Bernardino Arts Connection, Joshua Tree Music Festival, Joshua Tree Lake RV and Campground, and Copper Mountain College.**
